


Ancient China

Paper Lanterns

ACTIVITY #1

SUPPLIES:

Paper Scissors Pencil Colored Pencils Markers Glue Stick Lanterns have been used as decorations in China since ancient times. They symbolize good luck and prosperity. The first paper lanterns were usually made of bamboo and silk or rice paper.



Each color of lantern has a different meaning. For example, a red lantern represents wealth and prosperity, while a green lantern represents health and harmony.

Paper Lantern INSTRUCTIONS



1. Take a piece of paper and turn it horizontally.



 Fold the paper in half lengthwise and draw a line along the paper opposite the fold.



 Cut a strip (about 1 inch wide) from one side. This will be used for the handle later.



 Starting from the folded edge, cut a line approximately 1 inch thick, stopping at the line at the top.



5. Continue to cut lines until you reach the end of the paper.





 Unfold the paper and add any decorations you would like.
Don't forget to decorate the handle!



7. Roll the paper into a tube shape and glue the two overlapping sides.



 Using the strip of paper you cut earlier, glue each side inside the top of the lantern.

SUPPLIES:

Paper Paint Paper Plates Forks Ancient China was the birthplace of many inventions we still use today, such as the compass, umbrella, wheelbarrow, and fireworks!



The first fireworks were said to have been created accidentally when a piece of bamboo was dropped into a fire. Later, the bamboo was replaced with a paper tube and filled with gunpowder to create fireworks similar to the ones we use today!

Firework Painting INSTRUCTIONS



 Take a fork, a piece of paper, and the colors of paint you would like to use for your fireworks.



2. Dip the tines of the fork into one color of paint.



3. Make sure the tips of the fork are well-coated with paint.



4. Press the painted fork onto the paper and continue to rotate the fork to create a firework shape.
